Minutes of Meeting 23 November 2024

The meeting was called to order by President Alan Hiles at 9:00 a.m. in the Memorial Room of American Legion Post 202 located at 3669 Legion Lane, Columbia, MO 65201: <u>http://americanlegionpost202.org/</u>

There was no color guard. The American Flag is perpetually posted in the Memorial Room where we meet.

Chaplain Samuel Thomas offered the opening prayer.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by President Hiles. The Pledge to the SAR was led by COM Hank Hammons, Leslie Fowler, and Stephanie Thomas.

President Hiles reconvened the meeting at 9:40 a.m.

Treasurer Paul Whatley handed out copies of the Treasurer's report and reminded members that any member could request to look at the books by contacting him. COM J.Y. COM Whatley also suggested the Chapter become a Life Member of the **Friends of the SAR Library** at a one-time cost of \$1,000 (Informational brochure attached.) COM J.Y. Miller moved the Chapter do so and COM Russell Devenney seconded.

After discussion, COM Mitchell Moore expressed support for the motion and moved, as a friendly amendment, that the motion be tabled and put on the agenda for the next meeting to give members sufficient advanced notice, due to the significant amount of money involved. COM J. Y. Miller seconded the motion. Amendment and primary motion passed.

COM Russell DeVenney encouraged members to consider contributing to the **George Washington Endowment Fund** to support NSSAR projects. Brochure attached.

COM Moore announced the minutes of the previous meeting are on the webpage. No corrections were suggested by members. President Hiles pronounced the minutes accepted.

COM John Couts announced Brian Philips' application had been approved. Five applications have been sent to National for approval. Eight other applications are in the earlier stages of the process. And a Supplement for COM Fred Blanco s closer to being approved as National is catching up with its backlog. Genealogy Report of November 23, 2024 is attached.

COM Wayne Merrill reported that he participated in uniform in the Apple Festival parade with the DAR in Versailles, MO as part of the celebrations of the 250th anniversary. He also attended a grave marking in Farmington and Sweet Springs. COM Hank Hammons' gave a slideshow presentation on the Steamboat Arabia. <u>https://www.1856.com/arabia-story</u>.

COM Hammons recounted the fascinating story of the Missouri River steamboat which perished in 1856 and was carefully recovered in 1988. There is now a large museum in Kansas City displaying parts of the boat and its cargo. <u>https://www.1856.com/</u> COM Hammons described very recently discovered research that showed the steamboat ran aground on a sandbar and prior to it being able to be freed, the sand beneath the steamboat was eroded away by the river and the boat sank too deep to recover at the time.

The treacherous waters of the Missouri River limited the lifespan of steamboat to an average of 2-3 years; less than the 4–5 year average lifespan of a steamboat on the Mississippi River.

In 1988, 132 years after its sinking, interest in recovering the steamboat was renewed and extensive excavation work was conducted to bring it out of the field from which it lay buried.

The contents of the boat are now displayed in the museum and resemble an 1856 department store with a wide variety of items, well preserved due to being buried in a cool place with little oxygen. COM Hammons shared many pictures of the items and described the challenges of recovering and preserving the items.

COM Hammons' highly recommended the museum in Kansas City.

The 50-50 drawing for \$15 was picked by COM Drayton Shepherd and was won by COM Alan Hiles.

The Chapter needs to designate a member with the task of keeping track of points. We also need an Eagle Scout chairman.

COM J.Y. Miller will give a presentation at the December meeting entitled, "Silent Night." We need program volunteers.

MOSAR officers will visit and present programs in the first months of 2025.



WHAT IS AVAILABLE IN THE LIBRARY?

The Library's holdings include family history books; records of states, counties, and cities that composed the original 13 colonies (Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, and Virginia.); Revolutionary Warperiod history books, biographies, pension applications, muster rolls, etc.; census records (available in various formats); and much more.



In February 2019, the SAR Genealogical Research Library was designated a *FamilySearch Affiliate Library* by FamilySearch International. This cooperative agreement grants our patrons access to 350+ million *additional* images of original records and documents. FamilySearch International is a non-profit, volunteer driven organization sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

SAR Library Then and Now

The need to establish a Library for the SAR was recognized in the 1889 Constitution for the acquisition and preservation of Revolutionary War records, documents, and relics. An office was established in 1926 in Washington, D.C. headquarters which contained the "permanent records of the Society membership and genealogical library." The SAR Genealogical Research Library opened its doors on South Fourth Street in 1979 and was moved to its West Main Street location in 2010.

Service at a Distance

Today, a growing number of books and other materials in the Library collections are available on computers outside of the Library. The Library staff members are enhancing the catalog records and many now include the **full text books**.




NO LOGIN REQUIRED TO SEARCH THE CATALOG

These monetary gifts are also invested by the Society. Benjamin Franklin Subscribers, Life Friends of the Library, and Robert Morris Benefactors monies are deposited in the Library Special Purpose Operating Fund: Endowment Fund Contributor monies are deposited in the Library Endowment Fund.

Purpose of the Friends of the SAR Library

The Friends of the SAR Library (FOL) was organized to assist the SAR Library in implementing its collection development objectives. These objectives include those books, manuscripts, microforms, and online services as needed to enhance and expand the current collection.

A sub-committee of the National Library and Archives Committee, the Friends consists of the Librarian General, National Library and Archives Committee Chairman, Chairman of the Friends of the SAR Library, the NSSAR Librarian, and State FOL Chairmen. Membership in FOL is yearly and is open to all SAR members, State Societies, Chapters, and the general public.

Membership dues of the Friends are distributed as follows:

- 60% goes into the Library Endowment Fund from which only the interest income may be used by the Library, and,
- 40% goes directly to the Library Special Purpose Operating Fund.

The income from these funds is used to purchase non-budgeted items such as equipment, supplies and new technology, in addition to books, manuscripts and microforms.

Concept/Purpose

The George Washington Endowment Fund (GWEF) was established by the Executive Committee and approved by the Trustees during the meeting of February 27, 1993. The fund was created to establish a permanent restricted fund, the income of which would provide annual funding for support of NSSAR unfunded and underfunded committees and special projects. The GWEF is managed by a GWEF Board with responsibility for oversight of all aspects of the George Washington Endowment Fund.

The endowment fund has grown annually to continue support of approved NSSAR activities and projects. The corpus of the fund is never touched. Eighty percent of the earnings are withdrawn each year to support NSSAR projects with twenty percent being rolled back into the corpus each year.

Earnings from the contributions over the years have helped to finance a wide variety of programs and projects. Some recent projects:

The GWEF at Work

The Tennessee Society placed a marker (partial funding by the GWEF) in the Eusebia Presbyterian Church Cemetery listing the names of nineteen Patriots buried there. T h e E u s e b i a Presbyterian Church was established in 1794.





In a collaborative effort with the U.S. Park Service, the South Carolina SAR, and \$16,000 from the GWEF, an eight-part series of videos on the Southern Campaign was produced. These outstanding videos are available for viewing at: www.scetv.org/southern-campaign.



The Alabama Society had flagpoles and flags installed at The American Village in Montevallo at a total cost of \$14,000. The GWEF provided funding for this project in the amount of \$6,000. There are bronze plaques in place to recognize the contribution of the Alabama Society and the

GWEF in support of this project. The flagpoles are located just behind a kneeling statue of George Washington on a hill overlooking a replica of the Concord Bridge. Approximately 30,000 school children visit The American Village each year to learn more about the history of this great nation.
